1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
4 This Act may be cited as the "Municipal Infrastruc-
5 ture Savings and Transparency Act''.
6 SEC. 2. WAIVER OF CERTAIN PROCUREMENT REQUIRE-
7 MENTS.
8 (a) In General.—Notwithstanding Federal procure-

9 ment requirements, an engineer, in accordance with State

- 1 and local procurement requirements, for a public agency
- 2 that receives funds from the Federal Highway Administra-
- 3 tion, the Army Corps of Engineers, the Environmental
- 4 Protection Agency, or the Department of Agriculture shall
- 5 have maximum flexibility to select appropriate construc-
- 6 tion materials that meet the performance requirements of
- 7 the contract and that allows open and free competition
- 8 among suppliers of construction materials.
- 9 (b) Construction Material.—After the date of
- 10 enactment of this Act, a State or local government may
- 11 not prohibit or restrict any engineer referenced in sub-
- 12 section (a), from using a particular construction material.
- 13 Before a procurement is made, a clear description of the
- 14 performance requirements for construction materials shall
- 15 be disclosed in the request for proposals.
- 16 (c) No Restriction.—Nothing in this section shall
- 17 limit the professional judgment of a project engineer to

- 21 (a) Establishment of Task Force.—Not later
- 22 than 90 days after the date of enactment of this Act, the
- 23 Secretary of Transportation, the Administrator of the En-
- 24 vironmental Protection Agency, the Assistant Secretary of

the Army for Civil Works and the Secretary of Agriculture shall establish an interagency task force. 3 (b) Comprehensive Report.—Not later than 1 year after the establishment of the interagency task force 5 under subsection (a), the task force shall issue a comprehensive report that includes the following for federally-6 funded infrastructure projects: 8 (1) Reviews of competition for materials in in-9 frastructure projects and how States are succeeding 10 or failing in ensuring that the bidding process allows 11 for innovative materials to be incorporated into new 12 projects. 13 Identifies procurement practices at the 14 State and local level that are an artificial barrier to 15 competition for new and innovative materials. 16 (3) Provides recommendations for eliminating 17 any barriers identified in paragraph (2) and how the 18 Federal Government can help ensure open competi-19 tion and competitive bidding processes for all mate-20 rials used in federally-funded infrastructure projects. 21 (4) Reviews how States approve materials and 22 make material recommendations at the local level via 23 pre-approved lists.
